## From THE DIRECTOR

I first came across A Bunch of Amateurs several years ago, when the film was shown on TV one dismal and wet Saturday afternoon. Having not heard of it before, I felt I had discovered an unknown treasure and thoroughly enjoyed this little gem about amateur theatre shenanigans. I was to discover later, that I was not alone in my enjoyment of the film, as Her Majesty the Queen, after seeing it at its premiere in 2008, requested it be shown to the Buckingham Palace staff at the Christmas Party.

In the period between the film and play, authors Ian Hislop and Nick Newman made several re-writes of the screenplay to form the script, which added immeasurably to the humour and the development of the characters the result of which you are seeing tonight. In Nick Newman's notes at the beginning of the script, he writes that A Bunch of Amateurs is a love letter to amateur dramatics. If that's the case, it's the wittiest love letter I've ever read.

Newman and Hislop, both contributors to Private Eye, have collaborated on scripts on many occasions, most notably for Spitting Image, Murder Most Horrid and the BAFTA award nominated The Wipers Times.

From our first rehearsal, I could see how well the cast was going to make each of these characters their own, and, it has been a joy to work with them from start to finish. Teamwork has been the key word

here and everyone including the backstage crew - has worked very hard to put on the lovely production which I never tire of watching even after the umpteenth time of seeing.

It did occur to me to contact Burt Reynolds to ask if he would consider reprising his role as Jefferson at Stoke Rep, but sadly, he was to pass away before the letter was written. Fortunately, our very own action hero, James Freeman, stepped very ably into the breach possibly unaware that he was not my first choice.

Following some casting issues, I feel I must say a thank you to Lottie Morris and Sophie Wood, who kindly took on their roles at the eleventh hour, hot on the heels of their successful production of Chicago. But, my biggest debt of gratitude is to Craig Wood, who started out as my assistant, but whom I would now describe as my co-director. I couldn't have managed without his unfaltering good humour and support which have sustained me through my trials and exasperations.

As Jefferson Steel, in misquoting Shakespeare, says "The play's the thing" and my bunch of amateurs have done it immeasurably proud.

### **IAN HISLOP & NICK NEWMAN**

lan Hislop and Nick
Newman, the authors of A
Bunch of Amateurs, met at
Ardingly College, in West
Sussex, where Hislop
became head boy and
Newman was expelled in
his last year after wiring up
the chapel to play rock
music during a service.
Hislop began his theatrical



career directing and appearing in satirical reviews at the school alongside Newman.

The friends went to Oxford University, Hislop to Magdalen College and Newman to Oriel College . At Oxford, they began collaborating in scriptwriting for television and radio. Hislop also took over the job of relaunching and editing the satirical magazine Passing Wind.

Television credits for the couple include Murder most horrible for Dawn French, The Harry Enfield Show, and Spitting Image. Their contributions to BBC Radio 4 have included Greed all about it, News at Bedtime and the series Gush.

Hislop became editor of Private Eye in 1986 and has appeared on many radio and television shows. He has been a team captain on the satirical television programme Have I got new for you since the programme's inception in 1990.

He is reputed to be the most sued man in England and among the people he has upset were Robert Maxwell, later shown to be an extensive fraudster and Sonia Sutcliffe, wife of the Yorkshire Ripper.

Hislop's and Newman's journalistic collaboration has continued to this day and Newman is resident illustrator and cartoonist on Private Eye. He has been resident cartoonist at the Sunday Times since 1989 and also contributes to The Guardian, The Spectator and Punch.


A Bunch of Amateurs is their third play. They also collaborated on The Wipers Times, a play about the newspaper produced in the trenches of Flanders in the first world war, and Trial by Laughter, which tells the story of William Hone, a bookseller, publisher and satirist, who stood trial in 1817 charged with sedition although his only crime was to criticise the government of the day and the libidinous monarchy.

# Spotlight on... JAMES FREEMAN

James Freeman, who is playing the leading role of Jefferson Steele in tonight's production, joined the Rep in 1997, three years before the society moved from the old Rep Theatre in Beresford Street in Shelton. He appeared in The Deep Blue Sea and Relatively Speaking and was in Journey's End, the last production to be presented in the old theatre.

James came to Stoke from his home town of Stowmarket, in Suffolk, to study at Stoke Polytechnic, now Staffordshire University, where he obtained a degree in chemistry. After graduating, he stayed in the Potteries and worked firstly as a laboratory technician and later joined Johnson Matthey, the ceramic colour suppliers, as a Quality Control Supervisor. His most recent work has been as a skills tutor supporting unemployed people, but he is just about to start a new career as a maths tutor in a prison.

James has played leading roles in most of the 20 seasons since the new theatre opened and among his favourite roles have been John Merrick in The Elephant Man, Andrew Aguecheek in Twelfth Nght and Oswald in in Ibsen's Ghosts. He has also directed for the Players and his productions



He has also played a leading role in the administration of the theatre and is currently Membership Secretary and a member of both the Marketing Committee and the Players Executive Committee. He served twice on the Production Committee, the committee

that chooses plays and casts, and has taken his turn in the bar.

James has also branched out from the Rep to direct musicals for Newcastle Operatic Society and recent successes have included Titanic, Barnum and Chicago. He is just about to begin rehearsals for his next production, Oklahoma, to be staged at the Rep in October.

He briefly joined the Derby Shakespeare Society some years ago and that is where he met his fiancée Elena Fox, who has since played many leading roles for the Rep and for Newcastle Operatic Society. She has been cast as Ado Annie in the forthcoming production of Oklahoma.

James is excited to be in A Bunch of Amateurs, which he considers a very funny play, and hopes that you will enjoy the production.
